

A Record Setting Year

It was a record setting year in more ways than one for Neil Squire. On December 3rd, 2021, with the help from people and organizations from all over the world, we set a literal world record — a GUINNESS WORLD RECORDS™ title — raising awareness for affordable assistive technology solutions for people with disabilities.

However, most importantly, we continued to serve our participants with passion. Throughout the year, we offered services both virtually and in-person to meet the needs of Canadians with disabilities. And breaking another record, we served **6,641** participants from April 1, 2021 to March 31, 2022. Since our inception, we have served nearly **64,000** persons with disabilities.

Throughout this report we will be highlighting our activities and successes in each of our areas of focus: Innovation, Digital Literacy, Employment, Assistive Technology, and Collaboration.



We Set the #ATWorldRecord!, December 3, 2021

We have officially set a new GUINNESS WORLD RECORDS™ title for the most people to take an online assistive technology lesson in 24 hours!

In total, 1,816 people from all over the world help set the #ATWorldRecord on December 3rd and raised awareness of the global need for affordable assistive technology. Some of the participants were students, disability professionals, makers, partnering organizations, and disability advocates.



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Computer Comfort (British Columbia)

Participants

We served **82** participants in British Columbia, **32** of whom were new to Neil Squire

We had an average of **22** active participants each month

We served 130 participants through Digital Jumpstart

Tutoring and Tech Support Activities

We provided over **948** hours of one-on-one tutoring including:

474 total tutoring sessions **275** hours of tech support

We provided **450** hours of Digital Jumpstart computer, AT equipment, and software setup

We served participants with the following disabilities: arthritis, brain injury, cerebral palsy, chronic pack pain, epilepsy, fibromyalgia, learning disabilities, multiple sclerosis, mental heath disabilities, muscular dystrophy, polio and post polio, post-traumatic stress disorder, Parkinson's, spinal cord injury, stroke, vision impairments.

Distance Computer Comfort

During the 2021-2022 year, the Distance Computer Comfort program continued to meet and exceed the needs of its participants, and our volunteers continued to do an amazing job.

With their valuable contributions, they have helped increase the number of clients we have worked with, compared to the previous year.


